# THE FUTURE OF CHICAGO'S **Public Transportation**

On October 1, 1947 the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA) was created by the Illinois legislature who purchased by an act the operations and properties of the Chicago Surface Lines and the Chicago Rapid Transit Company with the hopes that Chicago's public transportation would be an example for other major cities such as New York City (NYC) and Los Angles (LA) by providing adequate transportation to the public and meet the traveling needs of its citizens in such a big city such as Chicago, which is the third largest city in North America behind NYC and LA.

The mayor of Chicago at that time was Edward Joseph Kelly who in 1938 "wangled an \$18 million federal appropriation to help Chicago build its first small rabbitrun of subway," said Kelly. Five years later in 1943 the Illinois Commerce Commission said "Kelly's proposals where "unsound." Before the CTA, Chicago was in need of adequate transportation because State Street Merchants, Chicago's newspapers and some Illinois government officials complained enough due to the bankruptcy of Chicago's streetcars and the so-called "rattletrap public transportation systems" that in 1943 Mayor Kelly and Phil Harrington, an engineer, had a meeting and prematurely created the CTA. Thus, in 1945 Illinois state legislators finally saw Mayor Kelly's vision by passing a bill setting the stage for 1947.

Nearly sixty years later the CTA is in more disarray than Chicago's

Chicago City Treasurer Stephanie D. Neely is hoping to bring a much higher profile to the City's Treasurers office than it has in past years. Appointed by Mayor Daley in 2006 and voted into office by voters in the February 2007 elections, she hopes to do her part as C.I.O. (Chief Investment Officer) to help people take advantage of what the City Treasurer's office has to offer.

"I remember being shocked when I asked people in the community and they had zero idea exactly what the City Treasurer's office and what was available to them. Hopefully with my influence we'll be able to change that."

Neely, a native Chicagoan from the South side, brings to the Office of Treasurer of the City of Chicago over twenty years of financial services experience with leading investment banking institutions.

Most recently Ms Ne Vice President at Northern Trust Global Investments, where she was responsible for working with public and corporate pension funds. As Treasurer her duties also include serving on five public pension boards. As an African-American woman, Ms. Neely created opportunities for minority-and-women-owned financial services firms by fostering relationships with Northern Trust and thereby helping them grow their

Ms. Neely holds a degree in Economics from Smith College and a Masters in Business Administration from the University of Chicago. She

has served on the board of several civic and business organizations, including the Chicago Summer Business Institute, the Chicago Chapter of the National Association of Securities Professionals, the Urban Prep Charter School the Illinois Council against Handgun Violence and the Illinois Sports Facilities Authority.

Neely is trusted with handling a seven billion dollar portfolio as well as making sure that it grows and draws interest. "Every dollar that I earn for this portfolio is another dollar that the city doesn't have to charge the tax payers."

At the moment, Neely intends to inform people about the various programs going on as well as support many youth oriented programs. "The stock market game  $\bar{I}$  feel is vital in regards to letting youth know about handling money and investments" said

# Chicago Responds to Pending Radio Shakeup

Shortly after news broke that WGCI FM (107.5) and WVAZ FM (102.7) radio stations are planning to change their current morning personality lineups, Chicagoans started talking, and haven't stopped.

"Crazy" Howard McGee, who's popular morning show has aired for the past 10 years from 5 a.m. to 9 a.m., Monday through Friday, on WGCI, will reportedly be replaced, as soon as August, by comedian Steve Harvey. Harvey, currently, has a New York-based, syndicated morning show that airs on WSRB-FM (106.3) during the same time.

The rumored shakeup also has the "Tom Joyner Morning Show," which airs 5 a.m. to 9 a.m., Monday through Friday, on WVAZ, being replaced later this year by either McGee or Doug Banks-a former personality for WGCI, who now has a nationally syndicated radio show.

WGCI and WVAZ are both owned by Clear Channel Radio, where officials refused to comment.

While there has been no official word from the stations or personalities, Chicago is already sizing up the future of black radio in Chicago.

"I do not plan on listening to WGCI anymore if they get rid of Howard," said Traycee Hopkins, a 29-year-old manager for Target. "I do not like Steve Harvey because he is 'old school' and his jokes are for old people."

If the rumors are true, and McGee

switches to WVAZ (V-103), what will happen to the "old school" listeners?

"They will stay to see what McGee has to offer them," said Bruce Brown, a telecommunications analyst for Bank of America. "McGee has market appeal to both young and older listeners, so whatever station lands him can count on advertisers following close behind."

Brown adds that WGCI listeners consist of 18 to 30 year-olds, while V-103 commands the 35 to 55 year old age group. But, one thing Brown said he does agree with is placing an over 50 year old disc jockey in a lineup that has, historically, been dominated by a younger audience.

"Bottom line here, McGee is in a winwin position and WGCI stands to lose a lot if they do not keep McGee where he is regardless what it will cost them," said Brown.

Insiders confirmed that money is part of the equation. McGee is already, reportedly, earning over \$2 million a year, which is rare for a local radio host by industry standards.

Tom Joyner earns more than \$7 million a year from his syndicated show and Banks earns close to \$5 million a year. Both are former WGCI personalities, who left to join ABC Radio in Dallas.



# OBAMA'S ANCESTORS OWNED SLAVES

Newspapers across the country report that Barack Obama's ancestors owned slaves.

Genealogist William Addams Reitwiesner uncovered evidence in the 1850 census of Kentucky that Illinois state senator, and presidential candidate, Barack Obama's maternal ancestors are listed in the antebellum records of several southern states as documented, African slave owners.

"That was a part of our tortured tangled history," Obama stated.

Whether news of the exposé hampers the ever-increasing political momentum of Obama at this phase in the electoral campaign, or gets interpreted as a meaningless coincidence, remains to be seen.

However, census data and informational records also reflect that Obama, who states that he is, at best, pleased with the outing of this historical truth, is not entirely alone in his ancestral ties. Reitwiesner has gone public with more genealogical discoveries, which include confirmation that two other presidential candidates, Republican John McCain and Democrat John Edwards, are also descendants of certifiable slave owners.

# North Lawndale Residents Comment on U.S. Supreme Court Verdict on Race and Education

Recently, the United States Supreme Court decided by a 5-4 vote that Race could no longer be used as a factor in school placement.

While the race of a student can be one of many characteristics taken into consideration to achieve diversity in the student body, it may not become the predominant criterion that determines which students are admitted to the most popular schools in a district.

In a major 5-to-4 decision announced Thursday, the US Supreme Court struck down race-based public school enrollment plans in Seattle and Louisville, KY that were designed to maintain racially integrated student populations. The majority justices said the plans were unconstitutional because they relied too heavily on race in violation of the mandate that all Americans be treated equally regardless of skin color or ethnicity.

"This is certainly good news as far as racial diversity in schools in concerned," said Martina Richards, North Lawndale resident and mother of 3 CPS students. "This will hopefully lead to better opportunities for low income and inner city children to get away and see other sides of life in more upgraded and racially diverse schools."

In Seattle, WA and Louisville, KY there were plans to use race as a factor in decided what they call "classroom diversity." However, many people who watched these events unfold says the real reason behind the plans were to keep "ghetto children" from attending the better rated schools in the area.

The opinion is the first to touch on the issue of diversity and education since 2003, when a 5-4 ruling upheld the limited consideration of race in college admissions to attain a diverse student body. Since then, Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, who approved of the limited use of race, has retired. Her replacement, Justice Samuel Alito, was in the majority that struck down the school districts' plans in Louisville and Seattle.

The 2003 cases looked at the undergraduate and law-school admissions policies at the University of Michigan. In those cases, the court upheld affirmative action in college admissions in principle, and it supported the idea that using race as one factor to promote classroom diversity is a permissible goal.

The effects of this case is not lost on Chicago residents, as the subject of school

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

A cup of watermelon provides 24.3 percent of the daily value for vitamin C and 11.1 percent for vitamin A.

Watermelon is also rich in the vitamins B6 and B1, which are necessary for energy production. Watermelon is a very good source of magnesium and potassium. Part of this high ranking was due to the higher nutrient density of watermelon. Because it has a higher water-

content and lower calorie-content than most fruits (a cup of watermelon contains only 48 calories), watermelon delivers more nutrients per calorie \_ an outstanding health benefit!

# Healthcare for the Working Poor

The cost of healthcare is on the rise everyday. Working families and businesses are struggling to keep up. As a result, the number of uninsured people is increasing.

According to the U. S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (C.D.C.), 43.6 million Americans were uninsured in 2006; that's 6 percent more than the previous year. In Illinois, the number of uninsured raised to 13 percent, from 3 percent since 2005.

"Lawmakers can't continue to pretend that healthcare is not a problem for their constituents," said Governor Rod R. Blagojevich in his June 27, 2007 press release. "Statistics show that families throughout Illinois are struggling more than they were just a year ago to afford the healthcare they need."

The Governor's insurance plan, 'Illinois Covered,' would provide affordable medical coverage to the uninsured and would also decrease the insurance cost of many middle-income families and small businesses currently insured, helping them save thousands of dollars each year. Thus the plan would reform the existing healthcare system to improve quality, reduce costs and require more accountability. The 'Illinois Covered' insurance will be purchased through employers or by individuals.

Under the Illinois Covered insurance, individuals and families without employer-sponsored coverage will also be able to save thousands annually. A family of four currently may have to pay as much as \$15,564 annually for coverage purchased on the private market. Under the Illinois Covered choice plan, that family could get a comprehensive coverage for \$2,250.

imilar programs like Medicaid and Family Care have enabled more than 500,000 low-income working people to get health coverage through the state. 'Family Care' plan offers healthcare coverage to

parents living with children 18 years old or younger. It also covers relatives, who are caring for children instead of their parents. However, for the 320,000 poor adults in Illinois who do not have children or whose children are older than 18, they can get health insurance through the 'Illinois Covered Assist.'

The 'Illinois Covered Assist' program will provide insurance for people, who live below the poverty level, do not qualify for Medicaid and do not have access to employer-sponsored coverage.

The Illinois Covered plan will increase the young-dependent-adult age to 29, in order to give parents more flexibility in helping their children maintain health coverage into adulthood. Currently, most plans disqualify dependents for family coverage once they reach the age of 22 or 23. This program helps many parents who have children in colleges and universities.

Since Blagojevich took office in 2003, more than 560,000 uninsured men, women, children and seniors got healthcare coverage; the governor's goal is to keep building on that progress. The 'Illinois All Kids' Program, which started in July 2006, has enabled many families to afford health care for their children. The Illinois Covered which is now being held up in special session, if approved, the first phase would start in January 2008. All parts of Illinois covered would be up and running in January 2010. Everyone is encouraged to write a letter to your local legislator and voice your support of the governor's health plan.

TALK TO ME (\*\*\*1/2) "Talk to Me' is not only a biographical drama about Ralph Waldo "Petey" Greene (Don Cheadle) who was an ex convict who became a popular and controversial talk radio host in Washington DC during the 1960's

This movie is also about the relationship and the difficulties he had with a straight-laced black radio programmer, Dewey Hughes (Chiwetel





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Ejiofor) whose aspirations proved to be higher than the comfort Green found becoming a local radio DJ icon during the turbulent 1960's.

Visiting his younger brother, Milo (Mike Epps) in prison serving a life sentence that secretly shames him, Dewey hears over the prison intercom the jive talking, record spinning antics of Greene that Milo raves and recommends to his older, uptight brother. Dewey meets up briefly with the outspoken and brash convict who confesses his long desire to be a radio DJ.

Realizing Greene has a lengthy jail term to serve before reaching any likelihood of parole. Dewey felt confident to leave an offer to "look him up" upon his release that would never occur. Naturally, Dewey under-estimate the resourceful and cocky Greene who arranges an inmate to fake a suicide jump off the building roof. In order to cut a deal with the unsuspecting warden to grant him an early parole release.

Once reunited with his ghetto-fried girlfriend, Vernell Watson (Taraji P. Henson) who besides her rough and flashy exterior attitude proves to be a source of support and wisdom that motivates her man through bouts of self doubts and who knows him better than he knows himself in critical Don Cheadle in Talk to Me

moments

Vernell pushes and supports "Petey" to collect on that offer. When" Petey" arrivals at the offices of struggling R&B AM station, WOL to meet with Dewey; whom he interrupts in a meeting with station boss, E.G. Sonderling (Martin Sheen) and executive on how to improve the station's rating and profits.

Many films have chronicled the reaction and emotion from this tragedy. Director Kasi Lemmons accumulate the

emotions and the history within the era with detailed authenticity of the incident brilliantly underscored by the defining performances carried by Don Cheadle and Chiwetel Ejiofor who galvanize this movie throughout that will touch viewers.

It is an emotional scene to witness "Petey" and "Dewey viewing the mayhem in the street and rescuing one of the white employees from a lynch mob beating. While the street riots becomes the benchmark that probably ignited his popularity. When "Petey" went back on the air to calm the black radio listeners and joined James Brown on stage for a free outdoor concert

But Petey's on air success wasn't enough to overcome his tragic past and personal demons as an alcoholic that begin to enter and effect his personal and professional life.

What shines throughout this film is the human bond forged between these two different men that knew earlier on how each filled in for what the other was lacking. In a moment of clarity between these characters; "I need you to do all the things I was afraid to do", "Petey" told to Dewey.

And in his response; "I need you to say all the things I was afraid to say", Dewey told to "Petey".

And this is the moment that bookends this movie into a love story that this true story also reflects

And without any homophobic tenancies suggested in their actions and emotions, understand the sacrifices, the pain and respect that dramatize the love and sorrow they shared in their lives. Enough to allow Cheadle's character to shear a single tear down his cheer.

In short, there is some remarkable acting going on in this film, which is also well supported by Cedric the Entertainer as the Barry White-voiced love DJ; Vondie Curtis Hall as the old school DJ icon

"Talk to Me" is just one story from the many black radio pioneer who paved the way for what black radio is doing today. Of course, being a Chicago native I grew up under WVON's "Good Guys" format that was owned by a white businessman, Phil and Leonard Chess that also established Chess Records. Now there's a movie in there that should be made.

But until then, "Talk to Me" is a movie worth talking about and seeing for yourself. This is a movie offers one of the best, funniest, most humane, and satisfying cinematic experiences you'll have amidst this over emphasized summer blockbuster movie season of hi-tech action and barely any acting that doesn't have the heart and soul this movie has. Pictures of Marcus Garvey and Noble Drew Ali hangs proudly bringing a sense of pride and purpose of African-American heritage to this culturally decorated shop.

El Bey (Master Barber), and his employee Carl King (C.K.) are busy working their craft and while the shop is still a work in progress, it beckons you to enter for a better peek. Ask the questions what does Al Mooroc means and El Bey a follower of the Moorish Science Temple of America will graciously answer.

"When you through the history you'll understand that El Morocco is a sacred, or secret name of America...it is actually a masculine way of saying America," he said.

# Free Acupuncture Available to Everyone

Two months ago I went to the emergency room at Stroger Hospital and was told to see a primary care physician. While I waited for my application for 'Access To Care' to get approved (an insurance for low-income), I have two choices. Either I remain ill in bed until my medical paperwork gets processed or seek alternative treatment while I wait.

I decided to see acupuncturists for free.

I went to the acupuncture clinic of the Midwest College of Oriental Medicine. Located on the North Side of Chicago on Montrose Avenue, the free Chinese medicine clinic has become my buoy for health.

I walk in the clinic's waiting room. It is full of people of different races and ages. There are two Ethiopian women and a little girl speaking Amharic in one corner. Next to them a Caucasian young woman wearing a black suit is reading a magazine. She must have come straight from work. I sit down next to a Hispanic woman, who is doing her 'English as a Second Language' homework. On my other side, an African-American patient tells me she loves the acupuncture treatment so much, she is planning to bring her grandmother here.

Approximately 350 patients come for treatment at the clinic every week. They range

from professional people to homeless people. Several of the patients do not have medical insurance; others do and combine both Western and Chinese medicines to get well. Some people come regularly, others, only when they feel very sick. All the seats in the waiting room are taken. I may have to wait an hour or more to get treated. But it's worth

In a treatment room, a student examines me. He then gets his work approved by the supervisor. Today Dr. Hui-Yan Cai is on duty. She double-checks the student's diagnostic and suggests a course of treatment. I soon find out that Dr. Cai is more than simply an instructor of Traditional Chinese Medicine. She was the director of the obstetrics and gynecology department of an 8,000-bed hospital in China.

"In China I always combined both Western and Chinese medicine to treat people," said Dr. Cai, who is a medical doctor and has a Ph.D. in Traditional Chinese Medicine from the Guangzhou University in China and a post doc from the University of Illinois. "I found only one medicine is not as strong as the combination."

I am astonished. Here is a prominent physician of two medical systems, making sure that I receive the best treatment for free.

"My goal is to teach people [in the United States] to realize the importance of oriental medicine," said Dr. Cai, speaking humbly of her life work. "That's why I came here."

And that is why the Midwest College Clinic is my buoy for health.

Since I have been coming for treatments, two or three times a week, I have started to regain strength little by little. I am given an explanation of what is ailing me, according to the Chinese medical system.

"[Chinese Medicine] is a different way of looking at health and disease," says Dr. Alan Uretz, the internship director at Midwest College. He has a Ph.D. in Chinese medicine from China. "Modern bioscience is mechanistic ... [viewing] the body as a machine. Therefore, health care is aimed at repairing the broken machine."

"Chinese medicine, on the other hand, is energetic," Dr. Uretz continues. "An individual is a unique configuration of a flow of energy. Therefore, any disease or discomfort is viewed as a weakness, imbalance or interruption of the flow of energy."

Although Chinese medicine is often used for pain management in the United States, it has been the primary health care system on the Asian continent for more than 2,000 years. At the clinic in Uptown, they treat anything from sprained ankles to high cholesterol and HIV/AIDS.

# Organizing your Financial Documents

If your drawers are overflowing with bills, receipts, and bank statements, then it's probably time to roll up your sleeves and get organized. This may seem overwhelming, given the amount of paperwork you're dealing with, but proper organization of financial documents can help reduce clutter and make things a lot easier to find. It can also help minimize the stress and frustration that come with searching for something you can't seem to locate.

An efficient filing system is easy to manage and can help simplify your life. There are a number of documents which are significant when it comes to making a purchase, applying for a loan, or verifying your income.

These items should be maintained. For example, tax returns and supporting papers are important and should be kept for at least seven to ten years due to potential IRS audits. Bank statements and payment stubs are also important verifications of income and savings, so they should also be filed.

Some other significant documents that

should be filed are bills, receipts for large purchases, investment account statements, insurance policies, credit card statements, health statements, birth certificates/passports, and car/house titles.

A good way to determine if a document is important, or if it should be discarded, is to ask yourself if you've ever needed it for any business transaction or for verification purpose. If the answer is yes, then it should probably be filed. If the answer is no, then it, most likely, should be shredded.

Once you've decided what to keep, devise a filing system that will enable you to locate these items in your time of need. This system can be setup in anyway you choose, as long as you're able to find what you're looking for when you need it. It's also a good idea to make sure it's easy for someone to understand, just in case you're away or there is an emergency. In this way, time will not be wasted searching for an item later.

Create categories for your documents (ex. Bank Statements, Investments, Taxes) and setup file folders for each. If you prefer to use old shoe boxes, that's also fine. The goal is to make this as simple as possible so that it's easily accessible. Ensure that you have labels for each category and a nice size font, or colors, for quick identification.

Next, gather all your records, assign them to one of the categories, and file them in your folders. Folders can be stored away in a drawer or file cabinet, and boxes can be placed on a closet shelf. If you receive bills and account statements online, and prefer to keep it that way, then you can look into storing these electronically so they are still organized and in a central location.

All other unnecessary papers or junk mail that contain your name, address, or social security number should be shredded. This will help prevent your personal information from being misused by others and will help vou maintain control of your documents.

# THEATRE REVIEW: "RAGTIME"

Ragtime is the theatre adaptation of the acclaimed novel by Mr. E. L. Doctorow, now playing at the Porchlight Music Theatre. Before the theatre version, there was a movie version, in which Howard Rollins gave a great performance as the lead character, Coalhouse Walker. In all three versions, Ragtime is a rollicking spectacle chock full of singing and dancing.

The time period is from 1906 to 1917, and the story centers around three families, each representative of America in the making. Coalhouse is a Black, piano player with a lover, Sarah, and a son. Father and his daughter, Tateh, are immigrants from Latvia in Eastern Europe. In the immaculate town of New Rochelle, New York live the WASP (white, Anglo-Saxon, protestant) family: Mother, father, Edgar, and Grandfather. These families revolve around each other like three moons circling the planet **Earth.** 

Ragtime is the music that laid the foundation for jazz. Coalhouse visits New Rochelle, attempting to win back Sarah and Coalhouse, Jr., who have taken refuge with the WASPs. He is in their home when the imposing Grandfather enters and is astonished to find Coalhouse diddling on the piano. Grandfather demands to know if Coalhouse knows any "coon songs." Coalhouse explains ragtime and begins playing in a style one can still hear in the recordings of Scott Joplin.

The third Father, from Latvia, and his daughter, Little Girl, find hard times in New York City. She becomes ill and they become homeless. He cannot feed her, or provide medical care, so he arranges to send her, alone, to an orphanage in Massachusetts. However, at the last minute he jumps on the train, encouraged because he has just found support for his artwork.

Coalhouse acquires a Model T Ford and, driving into New Rochelle, he finds himself surrounded by firefighters, with axes, who resent the dapper Black gentleman driving a new car. Coalhouse escapes, seeking help, but the firemen trash his Model T. He swears he will have justice at any cost and the final conflicts of the play are set in motion.

Ragtime is a musical with a capital "M." There is much more singing and dancing than there is spoken dialogue. Two songs are especially moving. "Till We Reach That Day," speaks to the nobility of struggle, promising only paradise in the end. Coalhouse sings, "On the Wings of a Dream," in which he expresses his hopes for his son and all youth. Famous people appear such as Henry Ford, Booker T. Washington, Harry Houdini, Emma Goldman, Admiral Peary, and Matthew Henson. They represent a wide range of opinions and positions.

It's a big play with a huge cast including: Charissa Armon, as Mother; Aaron Graham, as Tateh; Bill Ingram, as New Rochelle Father; Drew Mikuska, as Little Boy; Leah Rose Orleans, as Tateh's daughter; Alexis J. Roberts, as Sarah; Jim Sherman, as Grandfather and; Scott Sowinski, as Mother's Younger Brother. Playing multiple roles are: Anjali Asokan, Julia Black, Jeff Borck, Stephane Duret, Sarah Hayes, Renardo Johnson, Linda Kernan, Barry Irving, and Jayson Brooks (as Coalhouse Walker).

Terence McNally won a Tony Award for the book. Stephen Flaherty also won a Tony for the music. Lynn Arens wrote the song lyrics. L. Walter Stearns directed. Eugene Dixon is the musical director and Brenda Didier earns credit for the extensive choreography and dancing. The scenic design is by Roy Hine, the lighting is designed by John Horan, the costumes were design by Bill Morey, the sound is designed by



band of Viet Cong guerillas who take him through deplorable conditions and treatment at their prison camp.

Dieter is quick to privately make his intentions clear that he plans to escape, which naturally is met with mixed reactions by the POW's who have been there longer. But Dieter finds an ally in Duane (Steve Zahn) and arguable resistance from Eugene (Jeremy Davies) who could jeopardize Dieter's plan through his lack of cooperation.

During the daytime hours, the POW's are allowed to roam the compound while being watched by their captors whose food supply has dwindled down to rice and maggots. At night, the POW's are handcuffed and laid down on the ground in a slave ship manner, forced to sleep side by side in their own excrement.

However, Dieter tries to win the other POW's confidence, by finding a nail that is filed and sharpened enough to work as a key that unlocks the handcuffs after hours. But Dieter is advised not to try to make an escape at night. Because without any water from the rainy season, the jungle is a worse prison than the camp to survive.

While Zahn and Bale endure for the realism of their characters; the bulk of the film belongs to Christian Bale who delivers his most physically challenging performance since "The Machinist". Bale even tops Nicolas Cage eating a live, large cockroach in 1989's "Vampire's Kiss". Where Bale is visibly eating maggots in a bowl and capturing and skinning to eat a live water snake. (So I won't advise eating a large meal before seeing this movie!)

There have been several movies in recent years detailing the horrors of war through what one man is forced to live under and survive through that is

visually deplorable and heinous treatment. "Rescue Dawn" is another example that evolves

into this compelling, uncompromising movie that director Werner Herzog details the travesty of war that resonates through Bale's miraculous performance.

It's probably because how the script has been condensed down from the lengthy novel that also makes this the shortest in the series by keeping the action and dialogue moving, while retaining the complexity and secrets within the story and characters. This seems to help remove the previous stigma for the audience who might have felt like they were sometimes reading the book on the big screen rather than watching a movie. Sometimes, "less is more" can be an advantage. As long as some of the challenges from the book are met in the film version.

In this outing, an evil presence and an impending war loom over the fifth year studies at Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry. Harry Potter (Daniel Radcliffe) gets nearly expelled from school for using magic in defense and in the presence of his bullying cousin.

Potter is brought back to the "other side' by Professor Alastor "Mad Eye" Moody (Brendan Gleeson) and his crew from Hogwarts who takes him to a secret organization known as the "Order of Phoenix". Where Potter is reunited with joy to his godfather, Sirius Black (Gary Oldman) and allowed to hear certain aspects during an adult meeting; while exploring some family secrets about his deceased parents who are pictured as founding board members.

Still through more of this film, no one seems willing to believe Potter's claim to an altercation with the evil Lord Voldemort (Ralph Finnes) whose building an army in a planned resurgence

in search of the prophesy that would make him more powerful than before. (Perhaps, this is because some adults view Potter as still a child when he's clearly not anymore!)

On July 11, 2007 at the CTA headquarters located at 567 West Lake Street, the corner of Lake and Clinton, CTA will hold its monthly public hearing meeting to continue discussing the current state and the future of the CTA that was left in the air after this past June 13<sup>th</sup> public hearing.

"If we make no changes CTA bus service might see its totality," CTA President Ron Huberman said. Currently, CTA has an almost \$100 million deficit that needs to be addressed in order for the CTA to continue providing adequate services to communities such as North Lawndale and neighboring communities.

"There is a lot of speculation because legislatures are not vocal in Springfield in trying to get a budget passed," said Kim Wasserman, Coordinator, of the Little Village Environmental Justice Organization (LVEJO). Kim went on to say that a "far increase would be detrimental to residents of our communities" like North Lawndale and Little Village because they both are amongst the poorest communities out of Chicago's 77 in total. Also, in comparison to NYC and LA, Chicago is the third worse in "providing funding to its public transportation," said Wasserman.

This is one of the reasons why Chicago's Alderman Edward M. Burke, of the 14<sup>th</sup> Ward, has proposed to have motorist to pay a toll in order to enter downtown Chicago to generate some funding for our public transportation system.

Here are some other major factors that still exist since the June 13<sup>th</sup> public meeting that would affect residents in North Lawndale and Little Village if CTA does not receive funding from Springfield and the city itself.

A \$96 million budget gap would still exist; the Pink Line built to aid commuters and the CTA would still cost \$10 million a year to operate only to offer less service; the possible arrival of the Olympics that would

placement has been heavily discussed recently with the closing of three predominantly African-American schools. A Chicago Public Schools representative was quoted as saying "While its good to see racial tones somewhat taken out of the school system, we personally have never used race as any kind of factor in what children can go to what school."

Terrence Grant, recent graduate of Whitney Young High School, disputes that. "I know both I and my brother were refused entrance to a school based on race and that's a fact. I won't name the school out of respect for the school system and the honest people working there but I will say that when my family pressed the issue on why we were denied they said that we 'wouldn't fit in that environment."

Because of this decision, many concerned parents of Chicago Public School students are hoping that we won't see schools packed in without the necessary diversity and exposure to other cultures that is needed to get a grasp on society. "Now they won't toss all the kids in the same school according to their neighborhood and race and our kids and look at the world differently and grow together" said Rosa Martinez, mother of 3 soon to be high school students. "Now if we could only get them to exclude financial status, we'd continue to make change."
