On Aug 1, Open Streets will give North Lawndale residents the chance to enjoy the streets the way they want. along the route. This will be the biggest, most fun filled block party to date.

The **free** event combines last year's two Sunday Parkways event into one huge eight-mile event. Like last year, the Open Streets route ranges from Little Village to Logan Square, passing through North Lawndale, Garfield Park, and

Taste of North Lawndale and the **Breast Cancer Awareness Walk** will be two of many events that families can participate in along the route. There are no event fees, and participants can join in at any point

Activities, include children's games, art activities; dance and aerobics classes. Paint a mural, participate in a basketball tournament, enjoy jazz, a marching band and get information from numerous community organizations that can be found along the route.

Rev. Vivian R.B. Lewis suffered a 3rd stroke in May of this year. She has been hosting activities for youth in North Lawndale for more than a decade. Her dream of community Olympics may some day produce memory, inspiration and drive in some young people to continue on past her three category competitions of track, swimming, and biking.

In recent years, she has been adding on field trips for the youth such as her recent trip to Brookfield, Saturday July 11. She was able to fill two buses and four cars for the trip. Although she has been held back a little by the remaining effects of her stroke which ironally happened during National Stroke Month, she was assisted by her family members and friends to be able to go to the zoo with them. She was even out and about with her youngest son, Phillip Lewis, garnering donations from local businesses for support such J&J's fish located at 19th and Kedzie Ave, who donated a pan of chicken wings for the outing. The trip to the zoo was part of a grant that was awarded by Goodcity. For the past 23 years, Goodcity has worked to empower leaders and build community in underserved neighborhoods



The Economy has made itself the number one issue with gas prices reaching almost \$5.00 per gallon and having a domino effect on everything else sold, except housing stock which experienced a terrible decline with the high rate of foreclosures. The Chicago metropolitan area reported 5,821 new foreclosure filings in December, a foreclosure rate of one new foreclosure filing for every 499 households — more than twice the national average. That brought the area's fourth quarter foreclosure total to 16,949 and its 2006 foreclosure total to 57,706, according to Realty Trac.

Even transportation on the CTA went on the rise with one day passes increasing by seventy-five cents and monthly passess increased by \$10.00 from \$75.00 to \$85.00. Those are just a few of the increases.

West Side to Benefit if City gets Games

If Chicago wins the right to host the 2016 Olympic Games, the West Side stands to inherit a state-of-the-art multi-sports complex in Douglas Park that includes an indoor track. Instead of it's rumored demolition, Collins High School will receive enhanced athletic facilities. And the area will get to share in an economic bonanza that could bring \$7 billion and 172,000 jobs to Chicago over the next decade.

That was the scenario painted in bold strokes last week when officials of the Chicago 2016 Olympic bid committee addressed more than 100 people attending 28th Ward Alderman Ed Smith's monthly constituent meeting in the Marshall High School auditorium. Committee president Lori Healey led a panel of four Chicago 2016 promoters at the July 14 meeting as the organization sprints through the final weeks before the International Olympic Committee decides whether Chicago beats out Tokyo, Madrid or Rio De Janeiro for the prestige of showcasing the Windy City on the cosmopolitan stage that is the allure of the Olympics. The IOC announces the winner from Copenhagen Oct. 2.

The meeting continued a "50 Wards in 50 days" community promotion campaign the committee is conducting to "re-energize" native support for the city's Olympic bid. Sixteen meetings remain in the campaign, which is scheduled to conclude in the $32^{\rm nd}$

Ward August 19. The 24th Ward hosts the committee August 3 at a yet to be determined site.

"We're out to remind everyone of the great opportunity this is for Chicago to introduce itself on the international stage." Healey said, adding a Chicago Olympics would showcase the heart of the American Midwest to an international audience of more than four billion television viewers around the globe. "We also want to make sure everyone understand that no taxpayer money has been or is planned to spent on the Games," said Healey. They will be 100 percent privately financed."

Healey's comments preceded an audience participation session that followed a slick video slideshow highlighting the vision of Mayor Richard Daley to transform his hard, rugged city into a beacon of warm friendship shining around the world. She was accompanied by Chicago 2016 Communications vice president Patrick Sandusky and two other officials of the committee who also addressed the gathering.

Responding to the proposition that most minority opposition to Chicago's Olympic quest lies not against the ideal of hosting the Games, but stems from a perceived lack of real economic benefit to those communities, Healey revealed that a \$600,000 fencing and security contract related to the Michael Reese

Hospital project has already been awarded entirely to minority contractors. "It's the first contract we have awarded," she said.

She also lauded Ald. Smith for working "tirelessly" to get the bid planners to choose Douglas Park for the site of a customed built velodrome that would host BMX cycling competition during the Games. The facility would remain after the Olympics as a valuable community multiple-use resource as a cycling track with indoor football fields, modern tennis and basketball courts and entertainment

Smith, who emphasized to the audience the "vision" represented by Chicago's "out-of-the-box" bid to bring those benefits to the West Side, was also prominent in requiring the committee to agree to a memorandum of understanding with the city that requires it to pursue a goal to award at least 30 percent of contracts related to the Games to minorities and a further 10 percent to women.

Healey said such a goal was "unheard of for a private enterprise" as she stressed that "no Games since 1972 have lost money" and the benefits of bringing the Olympics to Chicago would be "shared throughout the different communities of the city" through jobs and improved infrastructures. The Games are projected to generate more than \$1 billion in tax revenue for city coffers while leaving a \$450 million surplus from a proposed \$3.3

billion budget.

The surplus would further enhance the efforts of World Sport Chicago, a local non-profit organized as a "living legacy" of the city's Olympic effort with a mission to promote youth involvement in sports as an alternative to the negative choices currently plaguing the West and and South side communities. Thus far, the organization claims to have already introduced some 30,000 kids to Olympic and Paralympic sport through programs and elite competitions

The audience was also informed that 50 percent of the tickets, including public transportation, to the Games would be priced at \$50 or less and that 500,000 tickets have been set aside for needy families who wished to attend. And Chicago 2016 has commitments from several foundations of \$10 million for workforce development and community programs to enable local small businesses to get in of the vending action for the Games and beyond.

"Our opponents all understand the impact of the Games," Healey said. "Tokyo has hosted them before; Madrid is aware of how much Barcelona benefited (in 1992) and Rio has a reference in having hosted the Pan Am Games and the World Cup.

"We have a great opportunity to bring those benefits to Chicago. But none of it happens if we don't get the Games."

THE UGLY TRUTH (**) Borrowing a cheap "Broadcast News" type setting and set-up for this predictable romantic comedy with a sitcom amusement level starts out pitting stars Gerard Butler and Katharine Heigl as romantic adversaries working at a local TV station. Abby Richter (Heigl) is a skilful and organized TV producer in change of the station's rating slumping morning newscast who can handle any chaotic situation thrown art her at work.

While Abby meets the demands of her job and her rating concern boss trying to wart off corporate management concerns. Abby is unable to handle her personal, dating life because of her "control freak" nature. Until she takes issue with the sexual ramblings of a cable access TV's blunt talking sex advice host of "The Ugly Truth", Mike Chadway (Gerard Butler) over frank views about men and women in their relationship.

Naturally. Abby's boss hires Mike to boost their ratings against her disapproval. But as outlandish as his viewpoints can be, mike has a knack for cutting through the sophiscated jargon and still has merit toward how men and women see each other. Well, at least in this movie here!

As Mike manages to prove his point through ratings success. Abby has an

outlandish incident at home that trying to get her cat out of a tree that also offers a stud-ily view of a handsome doctor neighbor, doctor, Colin Anderson (Eric Winter). She tells of her chance encounters that Mike decides to help groom her to make the guy fall in love with her. But naturally, in teaching Abby how to land Colin, Mike has yet to admit to his own feelings toward Abby.

Until Abby's boss makes her cancel her Lake Tahoe getaway with Colin, by traveling with Mike who has a guest shot on Craig Ferguson's Late, Late show" that happens to be a test for a possible network gig in San Francisco that she has to prevent by signing him to their station a three year pact deal.

But in the process after the TV taping and inside the elevator where Mike and Abby briefly let their guard down and their passion flow. The honesty of their true feelings toward each other becomes momentarily disrupted. When Colin makes a surprise visit to Abby's hotel suite.

And leaving Mike to misread one of his rules of romantic engagement/ by leaving Abby ad changing his mind to take the network job. Only to eventually lead to an on-air confrontation and reconciliation toward the obvious "harpy ever after" conclusion.

The only thing is amusing to watch because of the energy in some performances. In particular, Gerard Butler in his first less than buff-up role, shows he's got good comedic chops and timing that resembles a young Mel Gibson in "What Women Want". While Heigl seems to lose her footing in her role fro her initial character set up that by the film's end she doesn't seem to break a sweat in her finale bedroom scene with Butler. Now that's real "ugly truth" in a movie that fakes it more than convince us.

ORPHAN (*1/2) A laughable and predictable horror thriller that turns horribly ridiculous through its near finale plot twist on the title character who (without revealing its secret) literally isn't whom she appears to be. But this almost makes it entertaining

enough by its twisted sense of humor and. violence. In movies like these, where the adults are tormented by the sudden violent behavior of their kid. I tend to have more concern for how stupid the adults are compared to how smart and ridiculously mature and calculating the kid is. It's bad enough that kids aren't allowed to be kids any more. What does it say for the future? Where the kids are more liker adults than their counterpart.

But "Orphan" is just too smart for its own good, because it doesn't know when to quit. This makes fore the kind of movie that can frustrate an audience into loud outbreaks at the screen. In a weirdly played opening scene, a young pregnant woman, Kate Coleman (Vera Farmiga) is rushed to the hospital by her husband, John (Peter Sarsgaard). After Kate is wheeled into surgery, leaving a wide trail of blood behind her. She later is told somehow that the baby is dead on arrival, wrapped in a bloody cloth..

Feeling guilt ridden toward one of her two other kids, a five yr old deaf daughter, Max (Aryana Engineer) who just wants an older sister. Kate obliges by traveling with her husband to the St. Martina Home for Girls, catholic orphanage. When the couple finds a lone yet articulate 9 yr old Russian born girl, Esther (Isabelle Fuhrman) painting in an empty classroom. Naturally, the couple and child seem to hit it off well, much to the smile of a mother superior-type Sister Abigail, played by a wasted, cliché performance for CCH Pounder in an ultimately doomed role being that she's the lone black face in the

entire film that later becomes curious about Esther..

Esther begins to show her dark side on the family. When she has a meltdown from being teased at school for her clothing Creeps out Daniel, the older brother (Jimmy Bennett) by killing a pigeon with a brick he can't after shooting the bird with a paint gun. And

then there's the estranged relationship with Kate that is never apparent when told or her husband is not around to see for himself. Naturally, Kate begins an inquiry about the child, who begins to do things related to her alcoholic past that puts doubt and stress on the couple's relationship. Then, Sister Abigail makes a visit and you know what going to happen to the only black person in the film!

Esther even makes the deaf girl, Max her accomplice in the nun's murder and threatens her not to tell...or else!. The same goes for older brother, Daniel. Meanwhile, Kate can't get her husband to believe there is something about Esther in her past that needs to be investigated. Naturally, Kate has to undertake this task alone through phone calls and internet discoveries from a Russian institution.

Then Daniel is nearly killed in a burning tree house caused by Esther for finding her stored incriminating evidences. Kate freaks out on Esther in the hospital. Where she becomes sedated for an overnight hospital stay. Leaving her unsuspecting and naive (stupid!) husband to return home with the children. When Esther tries to make herself seductive to John at home and later discovers the true meaning behind paintings from an infrared light. When the secret ultimately revealed to Kate from a long distance phone call in the hospital that makers her rush to try to save her family. The movie loses whatever sick fun there was, to becoming more macabre and twisted. That won't do much for the adoption business while reflecting a new high in parental stupidity.

A Message From Robert Steele

I write to you today to share valuable information on the change approved by the Cook County Board of Commissioners to the Home Rule County Retailer's Occupation Tax and the Home Rule Service Occupation Tax.

In recent months the Cook County Board has heard various proposals to completely repeal the Cook County Sales Tax increase implemented in 2008 from 0.75% to 1.75%. Each time I voted against the repeal because I believe that it was fiscally irresponsible to support a complete repeal with the risk of creating a budget shortfall. I did however support the gradual roll back of the sales tax to ensure that we do not have to revisit an increase at a later time and to decrease the impact on taxpayers.

I am pleased to inform you that today the Cook County Board has approved an Ordinance of which I am a Sponsor to repeal the sales tax by 0.50% which would decrease the total retail sales tax from 10.25% to 9.75% as of January 1, 2010. This ordinance reflects a \$200M savings to taxpayers.

The following is a breakdown of the retail sales tax distribution as of January 1, 2010:

State of Illinois 6.25% City of Chicago 1.25% Cook County 1.25% Regional Transit Authority 1.00%

The entire nation is experiencing a difficult economic time. The effects of the economic crisis have hit every level of government and especially the taxpayer. This ordinance is an important step to maintain the fiscal stability of Cook County and ease the burden on taxpayers

Together we can be a part of the solution.







with dozens of small business owners, entrepreneurs, artists and investors.

The LBLDC, which also hosts a monthly breakfast meeting, plans to have quarterly After Hours get-togethers in the future.

"We have and ongoing agenda to facilitate relationships among small and mid-sized businesses, said Strickland, who became LBLDC's chief executive since 2002. "We want them to get to know each other, do business with each other. Our ultimate objective is to keep our dollars in our community."

"Everything here, each conversation is a relationship being formed and a possible expansion of business in the future for North Lawndale."

The group is committed to a focus on minority business development, and Strickland cited its role the establishment of Cermak Auto Auction last year, a \$25 million project that produced 10 jobs. "We did their business plans."

Following a raffle drawing for a \$600 software prize claimed by a young lady named Carmela, Strickland returned to his plan for the future of the organization and the communities it serves.

"We're working to get bigger and better. We have been building from the ground up since 2002. We have a growing team and the connectivity to the network of experts and decision makers to get it done.

"I don't know about stuff, but I know who does." He added it would take between "five and 10 years" for LBLDC to achieve it quest to be the best in its field.
