The event was Co-sponsored by Manley Career Academy Principal, Mr. Sean Stalling on Friday May 15th at Manley 2939 W. Polk. The special guest speaker was Freda McKissic Bush, M.D. who co-authored the book Hooked: New Science on How Casual Sex is Affecting Our Children.

Dr. Bush began by asking the students about their dreams and goals, such as graduating or going to college and how the

consequences of casual sex not only kills those dreams but in some cases severely negatively affects lives. According to Dr.Bush, when we have sex we engage our mind, body, and spirit. She explained that because of this, people should ask themselves "Is the person they are considering worth bonding with?" "Are they someone they really want to be a part of them?"

This bonding is why regardless of ones feelings toward their sex partner it can still create jealousy to see that partner with someone else. This is also why people tend to confuse sex with love. Dr. Bush explained to the children that they should consider the person they are having sex with as well as the people that their sex partner is involved with. Past partners make up a sexual network. Toddler's Death Ruled a Homicide

The Cook County medical examiner's office ruled the shooting death of a 3year-old boy at a residence on the city's West Side a homicide. As of late Monday, no one was in custody in connection with the shooting as Area 5 Homicide investigators continue their investigation into what is believed to be an accidental shooting.

The medical examiner's office identified the dead boy as Jaquan Reed of the 500 block of North Plum Grove in northwest suburban Roselle. Police say the toddler was a guest at a residence located in the 4700 block of West Van

The shooting occurred just after midnight Sunday. The toddler was rushed via Chicago Fire Department ambulance to Mt. Sinai Hospital and Medical Center where he was pronounced dead just after 1:30 a.m. Sunday.

Police reports indicate investigators believe a weapon was discharged accidentally. They also said two juveniles were present in the room where the shooting occurred.

The Illinois Department of Children and Family Services initiated an investigation late Sunday.

Man shot to death

A 32-year-old man was shot to death near his home in the 4800 block of West Polk Street early Saturday. The victim was identified by the Cook County Medical Examiner's office as Terry Johnson. Area 4 Homicide investigators are continuing work on what they believe to be a drugrelated shooting, according to police.

In an unrelated shooting, a 19-year-old Maywood man was gunned down as he sat in a vehicle parked in the 3200 block of West Ogden Avenue early Saturday morning.

The victim was identified as Raymond Parker. Paramedics rushed him to Mt. Sinai Hospital and Medical Center where doctors treated him for multiple gunshot wounds to his neck and left arm. He was pronounced dead just after 1:00 a.m.

Area 4 Homicide investigators are seeking the unknown occupants of a fourdoor gray automobile. Last Wednesday, a 38-year-old man was pronounced dead after sustaining a single gunshot wound to the head.

The unidentified victim was discovered unresponsive on the 5500 block of West Congress Parkway just before 8:00 a.m. that morning. Area 5 Homicide investigators were without an arrest or motive in the shooting.

Open Letter: Chicago 2016: A Legacy of Disrespect

The Lawndale Alliance hosted Community Awareness Meeting I: 2016 Olympics: Pros and Cons, at Dvorak School on May 12, 2009. The purpose of the meeting was to provide an overview of research of the Olympics conducted by DePaul University Egan Urban Center and to discuss the pros and cons of Chicago hosting the Olympics in 2016. Confirmed panelists included representatives from Chicago 2016, No Games Chicago, community organizations, and North Lawndale residents. Alderman Sharon Dixon was invited to share her views, but did not attend the meeting. There were about 80 people in attendance, including members of the press.

The representative from Chicago 2016 confirmed his participation weeks ago, only to cancel the day before the meeting. As a result of this last minute withdrawal, area residents were unable to hear the most significant arguments promoting the Olympics, namely from Chicago 2016. Chicago 2016 indicated that they cancelled because of their recent decision to only participate in meetings sponsored by the Chicago Park District in concert with the Douglas Park Advisory Council.

This seems quite disingenuous, as Chicago 2016 did not invite this group to be a part of the Chicago 2016 Outreach Advisory Council—in spite of the fact that an Olympic venue is planned for Douglas Park. Equally disturbing is the fact that no one from the community seems to know who any of the Douglas Park Advisory Council members are. To the best of our knowledge, no Douglas Park Advisory Council members identified themselves at recent planning sessions held at Douglas Park.

Chicago 2016's decision not to participate cost North Lawndale residents an excellent opportunity to hear both the positive and negative aspects of bringing the Olympics to Chicago. Consequently, it is very difficult for us to make informed decisions. Most importantly, we missed an opportunity to hear how Chicago 2016 plans to address serious areas of concern, namely:

· Plans to demolish the existing Collins High School Campus gym for construction of the Olympic velodrome; the potential closure of the Collins building as a high school and the resultant displacement of North Lawndale College Prep and Collins Academy students. Collins High School is the only building in the community that was actually constructed for use as a high school, and is of significant social value to the community.

- · Lack of community engagement in the planning and decision-making process.
- · Use of TIF dollars to finance Olympics projects
- · The need for an implementation plan that provides real economic opportunity for local residents and business owners
- · Lack of transparency surrounding site plans, logistics and financial projections stemming from the Olympics
- · Potential displacement of low-moderate income homeowners
- \cdot The role and membership of the Douglas Park Advisory Council.

If we cannot trust Chicago 2016 to keep commitments concerning a neighborhood meeting, then we cannot realistically expect them to keep their commitments to not use taxpayer funds for the Olympics, provide the Community Benefits outlined in the Chicago 2016 Ordinance and MOU, or to uphold their end of any other agreement. North Lawndale residents have been substantially excluded from discussions regarding the Olympics and the potential impact to our community. We deserve to have our issues addressed.

TERMINATOR SALVATION (***)

This is the fourth installment of a dormant franchise, following two sequels that lose their way from the initial 1984 film that was co-written and directed by James Cameron. Director McG proves to be more of a visionary director. This is unexpected given his two "Charlie's Angels" films. His visceral and virtuous approach here embodies an apocalyptic canvas that is down and dirty yet spectacular.

Set in the not-too-distant future of the year 2018, the film opens fourteen years earlier at the Lakeview Correctional facility. A convicted cop killer sits on death row, Marcus Wright (Sam Worthington) and is offered a "second chance" by donating his entire body to science. Dr. Serena Kogan (Helena Bonham Carter) has an experiment that literally turns him into a cyborg that she claims will help mankind.

Meanwhile, Skynet has all but completed its mission to destroy humans with its skyscraper Go-bots. Biker Terminators and other forms of demonic appliances help to reset the future.

However, a list of important names has been intercepted by the resistance during the ongoing war against the machines that is now more urgent and intense. The resistance is led by its prophetic leader, John Connor (Christian Bale) who learns his name is

only No. 2 on the list. After this revelation he sets out to find No.1.

While opposing the command officers battle mantra Connor has the faith and controls the resistance forces over his superiors who want Connor to follow their orders. He ignores human life and responds like machines

Elsewhere, Wright wanders through battles, thinking he's human in his search to find Connor, when he's befriended by Kyle Reese (Anton Yelchin) and a mute, cute black child, Star (Jadagrace) who are guarding another section of L.A.

McG is a filmmaker who loves movies enough to incorporate his favorite things in his films. Christian Bale's rugged appearance that is reminiscent of Mel Gibson in "The Road Warrior" and the symbolism with the pot of the human resistance trying to overcome the oppression of the machines is not unlike Steve Mc Queen and the other U.S. POWs plotting their freedom from the Nazis in a concentration camp in "The Great Escape".

"Terminator Salvation" is an awesome spectacle and a kick-ass movie. With a dark

and grimy war torn environment, McG never strays from a singular vision and moral tone that suggests mankind can win the battles, but not the war over the evolution of machines.

ANGELSAND DEMONS (**1/2) There is this assumption in "Angels and Demons" that - like "The Da Vinci Code" - author Dan Brown is trying to say something about the conflicts between religion and reason. But this time around, there isn't much of a conspiracy theory to invoke such notions. There's just a lot of stepping on sacred and historic grounds that ignites outrage from the Catholic Church.

some lessons learned by the filmmakers of "Angels and Demons." This sequel is more briskly entertaining than "The Da Vinci Code". This is not to suggest that "The Da Vinci Code" wasn't a worthwhile screen adaptation; it's just structured at a slower, more talkative pace that strives for that "higher intellect" with its audience.

But as many movies are generally interested

But as many movies are generally interested in faith they are also just as fascinated by evil doers and their motives. This means like its predecessor, "Angels and Demons" is designed to be elaborate entertainment, nothing more.

The film makes many brief dialogue references to Tom Hanks' cryptographic, treasure hunting Harvard professor character, Robert Langdon and his "relationship" with the

Catholic Church. The church has been uncooperative with access to their archives to complete the second half of his research book

It's an interesting parallel to reality: Even though the entire film was shot on location in Rome, the Church refused to allow any filming inside The Vatican. The filmmakers had to reproduce the Vatican on massive sound stages and other locales doubling as

lavish interiors.

In this film's opening sequences, a ring of the fisherman is being destroyed over the sudden death of the Pope in the Vatican, who might have been murdered. Meanwhile, in Geneva, Switzerland, an Italian physic scientist, Vittoria Vetra (Ayelet Zurer) has produces massive quantity of energies that are meant for worldly good, but are instead used to blow up St. Peter's where thousands have gathered awaiting the announcement of a new Pope.

Individually, Prof. Langdon and scientist Vetra are summoned to The Vatican even though Langdon knows he's not held in high regard by the Church. They also dislike Langdon's search of long buried secrets that would lead revelations that would alter the world as we know it.

While being led and misled by those within the Church including the pope's most trusted aide, Camerlengo (Ewan McGregor), the veteran and most disciplined Cardinal Strauss (well played by Amin Mueller Stahl), and the head of the Swiss guard, Commander Richter (Stellan Skarsgard).

Unfortunately, it's not hard to figure out who's behind it all. More damaging than this is the lack of suspense. Director Ron Howard fails to capture the danger and drama, which is needed to keep the movie in motion. However, "Angels and Demons" is entertaining enough because of the energy that was lacking in "The Da Vinci Code."

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St. Gregory A Hidden Gem In A Rough Neighborhood

Long before "No Child Left Behind" became the mantra of education in America and the law of the land, one small gem of a Christian private school in North Lawndale has been striving for decades on the front lines of that effort where the need is greatest.

Fighting for the academic achievement of the most vulnerable segment of potential scholars, St. Gregory Episcopal School offers more than 70 African American and Hispanic South Side and West Side boys a chance to succeed. The school was founded in 1962 by Reverend R. L. Whitehouse as an outreach ministry of the Episcopal Church of the Epiphany and is currently located at 2130 S. Central Park Avenue. Catering exclusively to at risk boys, the school offers a Kindergarten-8th grade elementary curriculum that focuses heavily on the basics of reading and math as well as faith-based character building. More than 2,000 low income kids have matriculated from the school—which is predicated on small class sizes and Christian spiritual growth—since its inception.

Today St. Gregory, which continues open enrollment for the 2009-10 school year this week, is led by the vision of Father Ken Erickson. This is his first year at the helm. Father Erickson builds upon the school's sterling reputation for academic excellence. A parish priest for eight years prior to taking the job, the motivated 43-year-old Chicago native brings a focus on faith to his duties and a mission to make St. Gregory a bedrock of academic and Christian service in the North Lawndale community.

"We are working to expand beyond education and provide a range of services to families in this community," Father Erickson said during a recent interview at his office. "We look forward to adding adult literacy and GE.D. training as well as tutoring and cultural diversity efforts among what we do in the near future."

In addition to academics and graduate scholarship and placement services, St. Gregory provides its students with daily physical education, including basketball and flag football teams that compete in a church league. They also offer a Cub Scouts program for students in first through fifth grade. The revival of the school's boys choir, a chess club, mentoring and other extracurricular opportunities are also anticipated.

Graduating students can earn scholarships of \$10,000 toward tuition at some of the finest high schools in the city or use it toward their

college education later. St. Gregory alumni have gone on to qualify for and attend such local academic powerhouses as St. Ignatius, Holy Trinity, and Christ the King high schools as well as Gordon Tech, North Lawndale College Prep and the Lab School. Class of 1999 graduate, Jason Moore teaches P.E. and tutors in math at St. Gregory.

"We are very pleased with what we have to offer here at St. Gregory, and we look forward to expanding our capabilities," said Father Erickson, who added the school will continue to cater only to boys. "We will go as the Lord leads, and we're on our way to some exciting things.

"This is our first year, so we're just getting our programs in place, but by next year, we feel what we'll have to offer will compete with any school of our size in the area."

Chief among the principal's plans for the future are to continue the progress St. Gregory has made in aligning its core curriculum with State of Illinois accreditation standards, increasing enrollment and initiating pre-school and after school programs next year.

Seventy-three students are now taught in classrooms averaging eight students per class this year, with 3rd and 4th grade and 7th and 8th grade pupils learning receiving combined instruction.

Seven fulltime and three part time teachers with more than fifty years of combined teaching experience make up the core of the school's training staff, which is complemented by a cadre of thirty volunteers including parents and board members. A parent/teacher association also lends input to the effort that adds to the "family affair" atmosphere at St. Gregory. The school also enjoys crucial support from the West Lawn Youth Center led by Pastor Derek Rollerson and North Lawndale Community Church headed by Pastor Phil Jackson.

For help in making the adjustment, Father Erickson relies heavily on advice and guidance from retired public school principal and teacher Dr. Bob Meehan, who serves as the school's education consultant. Meehan's advice and counseling on the school's behalf springs from than 35 years of experience in education. They are assisted by the talents and experience of Office manager

Rosia Carter, who also wears many hats as the staff jack-of-all-trades. The school also enjoys the support of tutors and a reading and computer specialist, an in-school library, and a large computer lab.

Ms. Carter, who is also a longtime Christian minister with an abiding interest in assisting atrisk males, said Father Erickson's first year has added a critical missing element to the endeavors of St. Gregory, which begin each day with prayer service in the school's chapel.

"He has brought spiritual leadership and provides a great male role model for the boys," she said. "[The students] have been transformed by his leadership."

The film makes a descent comedic run at filling the void left by John Candy and Chris Farley; this serviceable and silly comedy farce is a mixture of "Armed and Dangerous" with a twist of "Die Hard" in a shopping mall.

UNDERWORLD: RISE OF THE LYCANS (**1/2) This slightly better than anticipated pre-quel to the Underworld series is a violent and bloodied tale that takes place before the war. It's a story of forbidden love from an interspecies relationship. Vampire king, Viktor (Bill Nighy) spares an infant that later grows up to rebel against him as the half-human/werewolf warrior, Lucian (Michael Sheen) who leads the enslaved humans and werewolves in a revolt to oppose the despotic ruler. Viktor becomes more enraged by Lucian's relationship with his vampire warrior-daughter, Sonja (Rhona Mitra) who is pregnant.

PASSENGERS (**) An interesting social drama though stale at times. The film observes a group of plane crash survivors (which include Anne Hathaway, Andre Braugher, Patrick Wilson and David Morse among in pedestrian conflicts) who are trying to come to terms with their near death experiences.

The interwoven stories revolve around the characters' group therapy sessions. Patrick Wilson's role feels less traumatized and more appreciative compared to a psychiatrist (Anne Hathaway) trying help cope with her superior (Andre Braugher).

It's an interest human exercise full of the usual psycho dribble and personal paranoia we've seen before and executed better than the therapeutic offering of this psycho drama. It seems too conceived to create a dialogue from the logic and actions of each character.
