SINAI URBAN HEALTH INSTITUTE KICKS OFF FREE ASTHMA CARE IN NORTH LAWNDALE

"Healthy Home, Healthy Child" is a New Coalition Fighting Asthma in West Side Children

On May 4, Sinai Urban Health Institute launched the asthma care program "Healthy Home, Healthy Child" which offers comprehensive care for 2-14 year olds with asthma in the North Lawndale area. The program's launch took place at the Douglas Park Cultural and Community

Center. A number of community members, Mt. Sinai health administrators, and asthma health advocates spoke on the importance of asthma care for children in North Lawndale.

"Healthy Home Healthy Child" provides in-home visits to its participants. During these in-home visits community health educators help identify and eliminate the triggers of asthma in the home of program participants. They also review the use of the medications and equipment involved in asthma care to make sure that the asthmatic child in question is benefiting as much as possible from their prescribed treatment.

The program puts great emphasis on comprehensive care. Dr. Steve Whitman, Director of the Sinai Urban Health Institute stated, "When [Ida B. Wells] was asked what she wanted, she said, 'Well, everything, of course.' I just mentioned that because surely we want that for our children."

In addition to physical care, "Healthy Home, Healthy Child" addresses asthma triggers in the home. Mold, household pets, cockroaches and mice, cigarette smoke, and cleaning products are all household triggers. Sinai Urban Health Institute has partnered with the Metropolitan Tenants Organization and the Chicago Medical-Legal Partnership for Children to ensure that their participants live in an environment that is not hazardous to their health. Other participants include the

Chicago Asthma Consortium (CAC) and Breathing Freedom, a community based smoking cessation program.

Asthma is a chronic disorder characterized by restriction, inflammation, and blockage in lungs' airways. Symptoms of an asthma attack include wheezing, shortness of breath, gasping, coughing, and pain or tightness in the chest. Asthma is life threatening and greatly effects the quality of life of those that live with the lung disease.

According to statistics from the Illinois Hospital Association, North Lawndale has one of the highest asthma rates in the city. Children in the neighborhood are 1.5 times more likely to be hospitalized with asthma problems than their peers in other parts of Chicago. If treated early, complications with asthma are better managed later in life. The "Healthy Home, Healthy Child" exists to fight asthma among juveniles in North Lawndale. It is funded by a \$1.3 million/three year grant from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The Economy has made itself the number one issue with gas prices reaching almost \$5.00 per gallon and having a domino effect on everything else sold, except housing stock which experienced a terrible decline with the high rate of foreclosures. The Chicago metropolitan area reported 5,821 new foreclosure filings in December, a foreclosure rate of one new foreclosure filing for every 499 households — more than twice the national average. That brought the area's fourth quarter foreclosure total to 16,949 and its 2006 foreclosure total to 57,706, according to Realty Trac.

Even transportation on the CTA went on the rise with one day passes increasing by seventy-five cents and monthly passess increased by \$10.00 from \$75.00 to \$85.00. Those are just a few of the increases.

# Saving Our Sons Ministries: A Breath of Hope for Our Children

Today I was blessed with the privilege of interviewing a man whose spirit I admire. Reginald Akkeem Berry Sr. is an old friend with a fresh vision. He and his wife, Denise A. Berry, are working day and night to bring hope and healing back into our torn communities and lives. Saving Our Sons Ministries is the brainchild of Reginald A. Berry Sr., and it is one of the most innovative and effective projects ever launched in our community.

I asked Mr. Berry, "What is Saving Our Sons Ministries all about?" He explained to me that Saving Our Sons Ministries is a nonprofit organization that is committed to bringing about a positive change in the lives of at-risk youth through mentoring, education, employment, recreational and faith based activities. He also stated that his organization is committed to working with ex-offenders by assisting them in the process of becoming reacclimated to society. When asked when he first had this vision, Mr. Berry humbly explained that while he was incarcerated in the Illinois Department of Corrections he witnessed how the incoming inmates were getting younger and younger each year. He knew from watching the news on television and keeping his ear to the street that young men were also killing each other at an alarming rate. Mr. Berry desired change and founded SOSM along with his wife Denise.

Mr. Berry is a personable individual, intelligent and focused. He served over eighteen years in prison. Today, his mission is to keep the youth of our communities from repeating this cycle. I asked him how he expected to reach the young men and women in our community. He stated that he had a

three prong vision: The first prong is getting to those youth that have yet to be tainted by the allure of the streets. "Talking with them and mentoring them so that they themselves understand that they are priceless."

The second prong is getting to those youth that have already gotten out on the street and are involved in negative behavior. The third prong is to reach the ex-felon who has done ten or more years in prison. I asked Mr. Berry why ten or more years is even factored in. He explained to me that many men and women, after serving a decade or more behind bars, have a difficult time adjusting to a society that has changed so much over the years. Also, society has to be prepared for the return of these men and women who have served their time and now are starting over. "I propose what can be called a re-conditional house as a way of helping ease the return of the long term incarcerated individual," Mr. Berry commented.

I asked Mr. Berry where he saw his organization in the next 10 years. He stated, "I see satellite offices throughout the Chicago area, in schools and in concert with other social programs. I envision it going as far as we are willing to take it. There is no limit to the vision! I just want to be an advocate for the community. I am you, and Saving Our Sons is the sum of every person in our community – all are represented. Even those locked-up."

Finally, I asked about funding. He informed me that the Steans Family Foundation was a major contributor to SOSM, along with many other smaller contributors. He appreciates his association with Breaking Ground, and hopes to network with all positive

# **National Currents**

· On Monday at 2 p.m., a U.S. soldier in Baghdad shot five of his fellow soldiers to death. Names have not been released as the military wishes to contact families before the public is provided with details. This has been reported as the worst case of U.S. military non lethal casualties since the beginning of the war in Iraq.

· Iranian-American journalist, Roxana Saberi, was released after being imprisoned in Iran since January for allegedly spying for the United States. An appeals court rejected her eight year sentence. In a letter sent last month, the president of Iran, Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, asked the court to be fair in their ruling.

At this time, two American journalists, Euna Lee and Laura Ling, are still being held in North Korea for spying by the authorities there.

· President Obama reversed a court decision that would allow photos of U.S. soldiers ambushing captives in Iraq to be released to the public. The president argued that the released of the photos would put troops in danger. The American Civil Liberties Union has been pushing for the photos to be released since 2003.

testified on the program's benefits to their children. Martice Gray spoke of how the program had benefited her three year old daughter who was diagnosed with asthma when she was three months old. ### **Teen Shot Dead** on West Adams

Area 4 Homicide investigators were without an arrest or motive in the shooting death of a 16-year-old boy, who was gunned down last Wednesday in the 4400 block of West Adams Street. The unidentified teen was pronounced dead on the scene from a single gunshot wound to the head.

Initial police reports indicate the teen was approached from behind by a gunman who fired one shot, striking the teen in the head. The gunman immediately fled the scene and had not been apprehended as of press time late Monday.

In an unrelated shooting in the 5000 block of West Division Street late Friday evening, an unidentified teen was listed in stable condition after a gunman shot him, striking him in the leg. The victim was rushed to Mt. Sinai Hospital where his condition was undetermined. The unknown gunman immediately fled the scene and was being sought by Area 5 Violent Crimes investigators for questioning.

Another teen, in yet another unrelated shooting, sustained a single gunshot wound to the back when he was shot late Friday in the 1500 block of South Trumbull Avenue.

The shooting occurred just before 11:00 p.m. that night. Witness accounts indicate that several individuals were involved in a fight when suddenly, shots rang out. The gunman and a motive had not been determined as of late Monday.

#### Woman raped, suspect charged

A 30-year-old woman told police she was approached by a man who solicited her for sex just after 1:00 a.m. last Wednesday. When she declined, the unknown gunman produced a weapon and forced her to the 3300 block of West Warren Boulevard where he sexually assaulted and robbed her.

Crime statistics released by the Chicago Police Department reflect a 20 % decrease in murder and an 8 % of the 25 districts reported a decline in property crimes reported murders.

To date, 421 more firearms and 49 more assault weapons were recovered compared to the same period last year. Donald Faison and Mos Def in Next Day Air

**NEXT DAY AIR** (\*1/2) This is a forgettable and tired urban comedy flop. It should be marked "return to sender" for being an implausible and lame excuse for minority oriented entertainment. This is a comedy of errors with violent overtones.

From television's "Scrubs," Donald

Faison does himself as disservice as delivery man, Leo Jackson. The character is more preoccupied with smoking weed than saving his job. He is given one more chance by his mother (Debbie Allen in a "what are you doing here" kind of cameo role) who owns a parcel business.

A doped-out Jackson traveling delivers a large package to the wrong apartment number. His is unaware that this particular package contains ten bricks (kilos) of cocaine hidden in a

flower pot. It is expected by a Puerto Rican wannabe criminal and his sassy girlfriend (Cicso Reyes and Yasmin Deliz). They serve the ruthless Latino mobster boss Bodega Diablo (Emilio Rivera).

Jackson drops the package to the wrong apartment across the hall. There resides a pair of bumbling thieves, Brody and Guch (Mike Epps and Wood Harris). The two earlier botched a bank robbery (stealing only the surveillance tapes) and are presently stuck with a snoozing and smelly houseguest.

Adding insult to stupidity, neither Jackson, Brody, nor Guch ever seem to pay enough attention to the mailing label name. So, when the thieves make the discover their mistake they assume this is a godsend to makeup for the failed bank heist and decide to sell the contents to Brody's drug dealing cousin (Omari Hardwick) and his bodyguard (Darius McCrary of TV's "Family Matters" fame).

In the post 9/11security conscious environment we live in, it is an insult to find escapism sitting through the notion of mailing drugs via mail. The film's weak premise was not helped by the weak script's standards. Never have so many given up so much for so very little. Not even in a bootleg version!

RUDO Y CURSI (\*\*1/2) This delightful import from Mexico reunites the stars the writer from "Y Tu Mama Tambien" and is a definite crowd pleaser. It's a rags to riches tale involving sibling rivalry between two step brothers: the gentle Tato (Gael Garcia Bernal) and earthy and quick tempered Beto (Diego Luna). The two brothers work on a banana plantation somewhere in the rustic Mexico region.

The brothers who are nicknamed respectfully, Rudo for "tough" to Beto and Cursi stands for "corny" to Tato. Both are country bumpkins; their mother collects men with frequent misjudgment in a home life full of squabbling. other kids and a blind devotion to soccer (referred to as "fútbol" in Mexico).

Even though the brothers have vastly different goals in mind they still share the same dream of building a house for their mother. Their separate goals were a source of irritation from Tato. He practices after work to become a singer even though he can't sing. This annoys Beto who settles on living life amongst the bananas.

The film is told from the narrative viewpoint of an opportunistic talent scout, Butata (Guillermo Francella). He meets the brothers when they notice the scout's car stopped with a flat tire.

The brothers take Butata and his vehicle to a repair shop that happens to be across from a playground where pick-up soccer games are played. Butata watches the brothers play and becomes impressed enough to offer a chance for one of them to play pro league soccer in Mexico City.

Beto tries to capitalize on the moment by suggesting to Tato to defend to "his" right against the goalie. In doing so, Tato stops the ball that Beto wanted to bypass. Butata chooses Beto. Tato feels betrayed which begins a series of arguments throughout the film. Meanwhile, Tato is insecure and naïve on what to expect in the big city. He still wants to be a singer more than anything. Tato overcomes some initial confrontations that indicate the cutthroat nature of league sports. This lands him in the prestigious Amaranto Club team that eventually leads to him becoming a soccer star.

This does not happen before Tato makes Butata bring over Beto who manages to win a spot as a goal keeper for the Nopaleros team. Initially, the brothers share the rundown apartment provided by Butata. The agent not only gets 15% on each player, but arranges a percentage kickback to each team coach for accepting his recruits.

The brothers continue their personal rivalry throughout their twin careers. Each encounters the usual trappings of their success and fame. Unfortunately, this includes gambling debts to gangsters and messing with bimbos and drugs.

The two finally have the ultimate showdown when their respective teams play for the championship in a scoreless game. As Tato and Beto have to "square off" to see which brother can either stop or complete a goal for their team and, in affect, their personal lives.

This is a very sweet and funny movie that centers on the real life friendship between actors Bernal and Luna. The two display their characters' tumultuous rivalry while showcasing their brotherly differences genuine performances.


