

The program is being sponsored the Illinois Manufacturing

Foundation as an initiative to expand training opportunities in the Machinist trade. Upon completion of training, a graduate will be certified to become an entry level Machinist. Median wage salary for machinist is \$19.57 per hour.

To qualify, an individual must be: 1) Cook County resident; 2) Unemployed or Low-Income; 3) Mechanically Inclined; and 4) 9th Grade reading and math level proficiency. Those seeking to apply for the program should have the following: 1) Birth Certificate; 2) Proof of Income Status; 3) Expressed interest in a skill trades career; 4) Proof of residence; 5) Social

Security Card; 5) Copy of Resume; and 6) State ID or Driver's License.

Applicants can apply at the Illinois Manufacturing Foundation offices located at 2102 S. Kedzie Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. The IMF contact number is 773-277-2343. Training can be offered free of charge if you qualify. Classes will be conducted at the Illinois Manufacturing Foundation Offices at 9:30am every Tuesday morning.

the Fight for the Dreams he has for everyone in this Country, Please Vote for Barack Obama!!


Do you think Governor Romney is going to work for you? Do you think he cares for you? If so, then Vote for him!

North Lawndale News Op-Ed

North Lawndale is heavily burdened by type 2 diabetes. North Lawndale has more than three times the national rate and twice the City rate for type 2 diabetes. When you eat food, the body breaks down all of the sugars and starches and turns it into fuel the body can use. Type 2 diabetes is when the fuel (sugar) cannot be properly used by the body and instead it builds up in the blood. The major risk for developing type 2 diabetes include: having family members with the disease, being obese/ overweight, not being physically active, having unhealthy eating habits, and being over age 45. If poorly treated or managed, a person with type 2 diabetes can lose their sight, have kidney failure, increase risk for heart attack or even lose a limb like a foot.

Community factors can also play a role. For example, North Lawndale is considered a "food desert" community. This means that there is a big imbalance or "food security" gap between grocery stores that provide quality food and the number of fast food outlets that provide foods high in fat, calories and sugar. Other issues like community violence, vagrancy, unfriendly neighbors and litter can make residents feel unsafe and disconnected to the community. When this happens people are more likely to stay indoors, feel stressed and continue poor health habits.

Today there is a collaborative effort between Mount Sinai Hospital and Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois to help lower the impact of type 2 diabetes in the community. It's called the Lawndale Diabetes Project.

The Lawndale Diabetes Project has expert community health workers that go door-to-door talking with community residents about their diabetes. The community health workers work with persons with diabetes to understand their diabetes status. They also help residents with seeing a doctor and receiving proper testing. The program emphasizes simple changes to feel better. Making changes in diet, increasing physical activity, routine blood sugar testing, taking medicine as directed and seeing a doctor regularly are important first steps.

The fight against type 2 diabetes in the community starts with everyone moving to live better.

Facts about Diabetes and the Lawndale Communities

- The prevalence of Type 2 diabetes in North Lawndale is 29.1%.
- The diabetes mortality rate in North Lawndale is 62% higher than for the U.S. and 37% than Chicago's.
- Two out of three people with diabetes will die from a heart attack or stroke.
- Diabetes now kills more Americans than breast cancer and HIV/AIDS combined.
- Lawndale is considered a "food desert" community, meaning there is a big imbalance between grocery stores providing quality food and the number of fast food outlets selling food high in fat, calories and sugar.
- One third of Chicago's "food desert" residents are children.
- The childhood overweight and obesity rate in Lawndale is 67% vs. 26% in all of the U.S.

What is The Lawndale Diabetes Project?

- Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois (BCBSIL) is providing a \$1.2 million grant to fund this important community health project with the Sinai Urban Health Institute (SUHI) at Mount Sinai.
- This high-priority project continues previous anti-diabetes efforts by SUHI in North Lawndale, and enables the project to expand to now include the South Lawndale community and residents.
- Two-year effort aims to reach 10,000 adults and 2,500 children in North and South Lawndale.
- The Lawndale Diabetes Project is committed to working with the community to:
 (1) increase knowledge, (2) offer resources to support change, (3) foster individual and community action.
- Community health workers will conduct household screenings for diabetes and childhood obesity, and will help promote diabetes self-management to their neighbors.
- For residents willing to participate, the Lawndale Diabetes Project team may provide follow-up home visits and
 phone calls, offer medical and doctor referrals, free diabetes testing, and invite residents to attend health fairs, healthy
 cooking schools and diabetes self-management classes.

What the community and residents can expect

- As fellow Lawndale residents, SUHI community health workers understand your challenges and respect you and your privacy. Most of all, they care about the health of you and your family.
- Community health workers will visit homes. If residents are willing to participate, they will be asked a brief survey,
 measure height, weight and blood sugar levels with a minor finger stick, and gather information about medical care
 they receive, doctors they have visited, medications they take and their diet. Children can be checked for body mass
 index (BMI) to measure how healthy their weight is, and how physically active they are.
- The Lawndale Diabetes Project will share information about its progress during the two-year program.

THE SESSIONS (***1/2) This inspirational poignant true story begins from the actual news report footage about a paralyzed college student who survived being contracted with polio as a child; determined to live a normal life on his self propelled, motorized hospital bed.

Residing in Berkeley circa 1988, a talented poet and journalist, Mark O'Brien is a physically immobile grown man, living

in an iron lung tank who puts his thoughts, humor and experiences into the 1990 article, "On Seeing a Sex Surrogate" that is the basis of this film. In which O'Brien's one and only functional body part ignites the one natural impulse – to find and be loved and have sex with a woman that he wanted to fulfill at age 38.

"The Sessions" chronicles O'Brien's brief life and goal that was fulfilled through

A Distraught Father Is Searching for Answers, In the Unexpected Death of His Son Latricia Polk

Committeeman Larry G. Nelson Sr., for Chicago's 24th ward, is searching for answers in the unexpected death of his son.

"I just want answers for my son's death. That's why I'm requesting for an autopsy," Nelson Sr., said.

Larry G. Nelson Jr., a beloved son, and a pious man of the North

Lawndale Community, has died at the age of 29.

Nelson Jr., an Outreach Minister for the United Baptist Church, who loved to gives sermon at other congregations to preach the words of God.

He was known to his family and friends as "Lil Larry" or "Larro", and was the heart of his family and will be remembered most for his kindness.

On Oct. 22nd, Larry experienced a heartbreaking accident, when an unknown vehicle struck him near the intersection of East 147th and South Ashland Avenue in Harvey.

Larry a devoted father to his sevenyear-old son Antwan Nelson enjoyed playing video games, and being on social media websites.

He is survived by his loving mother Belinda Brown, his father Larry G. Nelson Sr. (Gloria Nelson), and his son Antwan Nelson, two brothers Robert Forks, Drequan Nelson, and one sister Susan Nelson.

Larry G. Nelson Jr., 29, was last seen on Oct. 22nd walking near the intersection of East147th Street and South Ashland Avenue in the South Suburb of

Harvey, when a witness claimed he was struck by an unknown vehicle.

"He got hit, but they don't know what kind of vehicle hit him," says Nelson Sr. He added "I think it's some foul play in it."

The reason behind his suspicion is because of the way the crime scene was handled. He believes that due to his son's body being prematurely

removed from the crash scene that vital clues were compromised.

"The medical examiner told me he didn't know if he got hit by a car, truck, motorcycle, or a bicycle he didn't know, he waited for the police to tell him what he died of. I never heard of it like this a day in my life, that was what the medical examiner told me," stated Nelson Sr.

Nelson Jr., was pronounced dead at Ingalls Memorial Hospital in Harvey. His father is distressed due to the non-existence of an autopsy that would reveal why his son's body was so bruised and a defiant cause of death.

"They claimed he was trying to commit suicide, they say allegedly he called in saying he was going to kill his self," Nelson Sr. concluded.

Even with all of the uncertainties with his death one would still asked why would a proud father, recently engaged, an Outreach Minister, and a graduate of Harold Washington College would want to commit suicide?

No further information has been made public, but calls were made to Harvey's Police Department with no avail.

three women. The film begins with Mark feeling frustrated by the insensitive handling of his current, porky female attendant, Joan (Rusty Schwimmer).

Wanting to express himself to someone about his concern and personal desire, Mark visits a nearby Catholic Church seeking consultation from his elder clergy. Instead, he meets the newly appointed priest; Father Brendan (William H. Macy) who's initially is confounded by Mark's humor-laced confession on what do about his current attendant and to get familiar with a woman in the "Biblical sense".

Then Mark enlists the services of a new attendant, Amanda (Annika Marks) with a jealous boyfriend. Initially, Amanda seems to be the one that accepts and appreciates Mark's plight, humor and intellect. Enough to spend more time with Mark at a picnic in the park versus her on-looking boyfriend nearby, This is enough to trigger Mark's sexual impulses that leaves to him rushes in to tell Amanda he loves and wants to marry her that drives her away. The experience nearly shatters Mark that lightly gives a crescendo to his misery and sadness.

But the next young, attendant, Vern (Moon Bloodgood) proves to be the right choice that properly works with him when he receives an interview assignment. While introducing him to the importance of being friends first.

Then Mark returns to Father Brendan for another consultation, leaving the clergy more that perplex to how best to handle the situation Until Brendan compromises his religious teachings to talk to a sex therapist, Cheryl Cohen-Greene (Helen Hunt in her most daring screen role) who turns out to be sex surrogate who prepares for his sexual encounter through touching his body part and vice versa and later serving him intercourse.

When Mark has to be rushed to the University hospital for respiratory problems. He recovers to meet volunteer, Susan Fernbach (Robin Weigert) that becomes his soul mate that, without being shown obviously put what he learned from the therapist to practice on Susan before his death at the age of 49.

To his credit, John Hawkes delivers the most complex performance from a vertical confined position that could be worthy of Oscar consideration. O'Brien is defined as a hard person to grasp through Hawkes' performance that like most men isn't complete until a woman (three times to encompass the different stages required) steps into their lives.

The character and film isn't as deep as the 2007 Oscar nominated French film, "The Diving Bell and the Butterfly" about a paralyzed magazine editor who could only communicate using his left eye. Or even sermonized as done by Richard Dreyfuss as a quadriplegic car accident victim who was paralyzed from the neck down who wanted to die by his terms not the doctors in 1981's "Whose Life Is It Anyway?"

Between these two films, "The Sessions" is this "little big film" well balanced by director Ben Lewin's pragmatic script that also shows the disabled wanting to live normal; have come a long way without being sentimental or cliché.

And, while Mark O'Brien's life and article brought attention to the concerns of normalcy toward the disabled. "The Sessions" is a unique love story set off by the everyday desire many able people feel. And in some case, don't achieve to the degree Mark O'Brien obtained in his brief but fulfilled life.

But the difference here, Frosty doesn't view his methods as reflective life lessons that his wife notices and gently coaches her husband against being so rough and insensitive toward the kid who sees in Frosty what is missing at

However, when Frosty's wife suffers a stroke and dies suddenly. The local surfer legend stops living. And this is where the student becomes the teacher to show the lessons taught were not only learned but passed on between them to help bring back the meaning and focus to their life.

So when its time to confront the Maverick waves before surfing season ends, the town is aware of Jay's personal quest and come out to watch him defy the elements along with Frosty and Kim watching from the shoreline

Not unlike to a certain degree, 2011's "Soul Surfer", another fact based surfer life story about overcoming adversary from a freak accident. Jay Moriarty learns to overcome fears that

weren't in the water. But instead, on dry land and within himself, trying to find himself through his obsession while coming of age in a life too brief but far from being meaningless.

Beautiful photography and camera work on the surfing sequences. Reportedly, Michael Apted step in to salvage the last three weeks of filming when original director Curtis Hanson had to leave for health reason. The end result is almost a seamless transition that doesn't disrupts the flow of the story and characters. While maintaining a level that doesn't become a sentimental downer but a re-affirmation to living life in whatever time life gives one.

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
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
